# **ENGAGING PARENTS THR**

We know that for parents, it can be difficult to make decisions about their child's health needs. We work to provide parents with valuable information about how to make proper health decisions on a regular basis. We help parents understand how to prevent sickness and injuries so that children can attend school regularly, positively impacting their overall performance in school. These efforts improve a family's health literacy, or how well families are able to find, understand, and use valuable resources to make informed decisions regarding health.

### **HEAD START TO HEALTH**

In October 2015, together with the RichSoil Alliance, a nonprofit organization dedicated to improving the lives of children and families in our community, Luzerne County Head Start held the first "Health Literacy Event" in Luzerne County. Developed by UCLA/Johnson & Johnson Advanced Health Care Institute, the program provides a comprehensive approach to health empowerment for Head Start parents, children and staff. Sponsored by the United Way of Wyoming Valley, Geisinger Health System, and other community donations, local Head Start alumnus, Dave Kuharchik, hosted the first "Head Start to Health" event.

Parents enjoyed a delicious lunch held at the Woodlands Inn while learning how to care for their children when they are sick and when it is appropriate to send them to school. They participated in a hands-on program presented by staff and health professionals from Head Start, Maternal Health & Family Services WIC Program, the PA Dept. of Health, Harrold's Pharmacy, Loren Grossman D.M.D., the American Heart Association, the Family Hearing Center, the Children's Service Center, and other community organizations. The Wilkes-Barre City Health Department dispensed free flu shots. Over 80 Head Start families and community members participated in this community event.

# OUGH HEALTH LITERACY



### LOVE THEM PROTECT THEM

Sponsored by PNC Bank and the Grow Up Great initiative, Luzerne County Head Start and the RichSoil Alliance hosted the 2nd Health Literacy event in June 2016. The event took place at King's College, where families learned about home safety prevention, oral health, and summer skin care. Approximately 63 families participated in this hands-on program presented by Head Start staff and health professionals. Head Start alumnus, and local PA Live host, Dave Kuharchik, hosted the event. Geisinger Health System Dermatologist, Dr. Christine E. Cabell provided families with valuable information about summer skin care. Casey Dental Pediatric Dentist and Head Start Board member, Dr. Deep Shah presented information regarding proper dental care for young children, and Head Start Health Specialist, Allyson Leskowsky, BSN discussed ways families can lead healthy lifestyles. Other local agencies provided additional information and sponsored giveaway items. Items included 3 bicycles and helmets donated by the Wilkes-Barre Scranton Penguins partnered with Geisinger Health System, Kohl's Moving4Health, and Paul Lumia, Executive Director/Founder of North Branch Land Trust.




### READY FOR SCHOOL, READY TO LEARN

Luzerne County Head Start school readiness goals are outcomes-focused, and they address developmental domains of learning for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers.


Early Head Start Children 2 To 3 Years





The 2016 Community Indicators Report developed by the Institute for Public & Economic Development states that 3,280 children between the ages of 3 & 4 were served by high quality Pre-K programs. However, 4,830 of eligible children were not enrolled in an early childhood education program. According to the Office of Child Development and Early Learning Reach and Risk Assessment, 26.8% of children under age 5 are living in economically high-risk families with incomes at or below 100% of the federal poverty guidelines.


### 2015 Expenses by Program


### 2016 Projected Budget by Program Service

### ACCOUNTABILITY

Federal legislation requires that all Head Start programs receive a comprhensive on-site review each year. Luzerne County Head Start's most recent review was conducted in March 2016. Fifteen areas were found to be in compliance, and two areas were found to be non-compliant. All areas have been corrected.
